Undergraduate Handbook

Information on the structure, policies, and operational procedures of the School of Film and Television and its Undergraduate programs

Introduction

This handbook is a general reference to the structure, policies, and operational procedures of the School of Film and Television and its Undergraduate programs. It is not intended to be a comprehensive planning guide. Students are expected to consult with the SFTV Academic Advisement Center as well as consult the LMU University Bulletin* regarding their plan of study.

Academic Standards

Academic Standing - Academic Probation

SFTV undergraduates must maintain a **cumulative GPA of at least 2.0** (C average) throughout the program in order to graduate.

If a student's cumulative or term **GPA falls below 2.0, the student will be placed on academic probation** and be notified by the SFTV Academic Advisement Center of the probation status.

Process for academic probation:

- A hold is placed on the student's record preventing registration changes among other academic transactions.
- Students are encouraged to complete a self-assessment and create an improvement plan with SFTV Advising.
- This hold may be removed after meeting with SFTV Advising.
- Probation is lifted after the student reaches 2.0 GPA in both semester and cumulative records.

Academic Standing - Academic Disqualification

Students who remain on academic probation for two consecutive semesters are subject to disqualification from the University. Disqualification terminates a student's relationship with the University. A disqualified student may not register for any classes and is denied all privileges of the University and of all organizations or activities in any way connected with it.

Mid-term Deficiencies

Students may receive a mid-term deficiency in a course around the midpoint of the semester. A mid-term deficiency serves as a warning from an instructor that the student is at risk of not passing the class. A mid-term deficiency is not part of the permanent record.

Mid-term deficiencies might be issued if a student is in danger of not meeting minimum requirements.

- Students much earn a C-or better for a course to count in the core curriculum.
- Be sure to check your University Bulletin to understand if your program has minimum grade requirements for any particular class.



Maintain a GPA of 2.0 or higher in order to avoid academic probation and graduate on time.

Student Responsibility

The University Bulletin contains the academic and administrative policies and regulations that govern enrollment of undergraduate, graduate, and postbaccalaureate students at Loyola Marymount University. Students are responsible for knowing academic and administrative policies and regulations affecting their program of study and for abiding by all such policies and regulations during their period of enrollment at the University. Continued enrollment is subject to compliance with the academic and administrative policies and regulations. Failure to understand the policies and regulations does not relieve a student of her or his responsibility for adhering to the policies and regulations.

Students are governed by the applicable University and degree requirements in the University Bulletin of their entry year into the University. Students must normally fulfill the department major or program requirements in effect when they declare the primary major or program of study. If these requirements have been modified since the most recent Bulletin, students may be required to fulfill those with the most recent date. Students are advised to consult the chairperson of the major department or the appropriate program director for the correct information.

Academic Honesty

Loyola Marymount University is a community dedicated to academic excellence. Academic honesty in scholarship and creative work stands at the center of LMU's academic life, and is essential for true learning and creation of knowledge to take place. As a university in the Jesuit and Marymount traditions, this community expects itsmembers to act in accordance with the highest standards ofhonesty and ethics at all times. Violations of academic honesty undermine the fundamental educational mission of the University and cannot be tolerated. Students are responsible for understanding the standards of academic honesty and determining how they apply to their academic work and behavior. Students are responsible for contacting their instructor(s) before assignments are due to proactively resolve any questions they may have.



Ignorance isn't an excuse - you are responsible for understanding the requirements for graduation and upholding academic standards.

Degree and Graduation Requirements

General Degree Requirements

All candidates for a baccalaureate degree at LMU must fulfill the following requirements:

- For the primary academic major complete a minimum of 120 semester hours, including core curriculum, program requirements, and 45 semester hours of upper-division course work. Certain programs require more than 120 semester hours and are under the appropriate department listings.
- All courses taken at LMU must have a cumulative grade point average of C (2.0). All courses taken in the major, minor, or area of concentration must have a cumulative grade point average of C (2.0). To satisfy a Core requirement (other than a flag requirement), a course must be completed with a grade of C-or better. To satisfy a flag requirement, a course must be completed with a grade of D or better.
- Fulfill the requirements for any declared academic secondary major or primary or secondary minor, including those set forth by the department and/or College or School.
- At least 30 of the last 36 semester hours for the bachelor's degree must be taken in residence at LMU. At least two-thirds of the upper division semester hours of the major must be takenin residence at LMU, unless, for programmatic purposes, the Dean and the Chair of the major department deem an exception appropriate.
- Fulfill the academic regulations printed in the University Bulletin in effect at the time of entrance or for those in effect in the senior year provided the student maintains continuous enrollment for the length of the degree program. A student who changes his or her program of study subsequent to admission to the University may be held responsible for the academic regulations in effect at the time of the declaration or change. A student who interrupts LMU enrollment for more than two years is subject to the academic regulations in effect in the University Bulletin at the time of readmission.
- Fulfill the requirements specified in Baccalaureate Graduation Requirements and Degree Conferral.

Here's what you need to graduate:

- Complete 120 semester hours
 - 45 hours must be upper division
 - 30 out of the last 36 hours must be taken at LMU
- Earn a GPA of 2.0 or higher
- Fulfill requirements for primary major, core curriculum, and flag requirements

Applying for Your Degree

Degree conferral is not automatic! You must apply for your degree in advance of your graduation semester. Depending on your application timeline, your degree may be dated May, August, or December. To request your degree conferral, you must:

- Submit an Application for Degree form to the Office of the Registrar* by
 the stated deadline in the term in which all academic and graduation
 requirements will have been met. If a student is canceled for graduation in a
 given term, the student must submit a new Application for Degree form for a
 subsequent graduation term.
- Complete any incomplete work required for the degree prior to the degree date of that term. A grade of Incomplete in a required course at the time of degree posting renders the student ineligible for that degree date.
- Submit an official transcript showing the graded course(s) taken at other
 institutions and transfer course approval form (if not previously submitted)
 to the Office of the Registrar no later than 30 working days after the end of
 the LMU semester. The transfer course(s) must be completed in a term
 which ends prior to the degree date.



Apply for your degree at the beginning of the semester that you plan to graduate.

Academic and Pre-Registration Advising

Your Faculty Advisor

All SFTV students are assigned to a Faculty Advisor. Your assigned **Faculty Advisor can be found in DegreeWorks**.

Your Faculty Advisor will guide you in selecting major courses to compliment your academic and career goals. Faculty Advisors can also be a great resource for offering advice on internships, research opportunities, learning communities, and more! You are encouraged to meet with your Faculty Advisors regularly to help build a professional relationship. You are welcome to meet with your Faculty Advisor to discuss your academic and professional goals, as well as your major courses for the following semester.

Faculty advisors can help in:

- Understanding the academic discipline and your field of study
- Understanding your major requirements
- Career pathways support
- Discuss interests within in your major
- Identify research opportunities

- Find relevant internships
- Plan for graduate school

SFTV Academic Advising

The SFTV Academic Advisement Center is here to support SFTV's undergraduate community through collaborative and comprehensive advising services as our students explore, navigate, and graduate. Registering for Classes

You are responsible for registering for your courses online prior to the start of the term. Registration for classes is completed on the PROWL website*, which can be accessed via MyLMU*. Pre-registration advising is available through your Faculty Advisor and/or with SFTV Advising. We recommend that students meet with advisors early in the semester if they need 1-1 assistance. Registration troubleshooting is available during the registration period with limited spots.



When your registration period starts, make sure you have a plan:

- Prioritize classes you need for your major
- Prepare backup course options for your major/core/electives
- Enroll in enough hours to keep you on track to graduating

- Increase awareness of procrastination and identify ways to get back on track
- Assist with exam preparation and test taking strategies

Scholarships

All SFTV scholarship awards are automatically considered alongside your application for admissionand require FASFA completion. Scholarship eligibility is generally based upon different factors including merit-related criteria, academic achievement, financial need, talent, and/or leadership. SFTV students do not need to apply separately for any awards.
