





An Exorcise in Exorcism (Pilot, Half-Hour, Single-Camera Mockumentary)

A comedic chronicle of the production of the hit show "Exorcism on the Edge," a reality series based on actual exorcisms, which has just been put in the hands of the newly promoted, highly neurotic Annalise Buchanan.



Time Wibbly Wobbly (Pilot, Half-Hour Sci-fi Drama) A rag tag team of time traveling robin hoods aim to use their knowledge of the future to improve the lives of those deemed "temporally insignificant" throughout history, despite the dangers of journeying back while Black.

Tokens (Pilot, One-Hour Dramedy)

Two sets of minority siblings fight stereotypes, social norms, and gender expectations, while just trying to be themselves, when they become the tokens at their new office and school, disrupting the unvaried status quo.

In 1980 New York, a hard-working Colombian immigrant, desperate to do anything to help his family, finds himself forced into the fast-paced world of drug running. Under the thumb of a ruthless queenpin, he finds the "American Dream" isn't what he expected.

The Dream Dress (One-Act Play) Never having had her own Quinceañera, a mother-daughter relationship hangs in the balance as Mom tailors a dream dress, that for the daughter, is a nightmare.

Guilty Party (Feature, Crime Drama) A privileged heir to a rum empire, accused of rape, goes to the victim to evade prison and helps find the true perpetrator.
